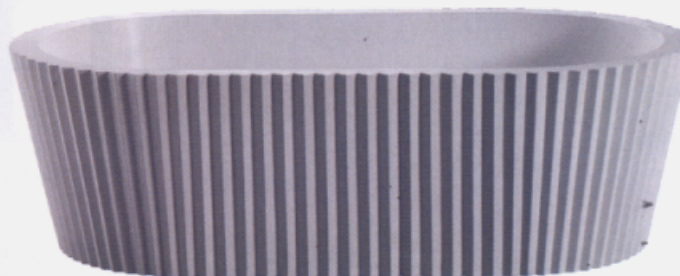
WHITE ON
